A Long History and an Eye on the Future

Parts of our wonderful buildings date back to 1877. Our pupils also have access to an enormous field, a wide variety of outdoor learning areas, and two well-stocked libraries. IT resources of 60 Chromebooks, over 30 laptops a suite of 15 desk top computers and over 45 iPads allow us to prepare our pupils for the digital demands of the 21st century. Each classroom is also equipped with an interactive whiteboard. We have ordered substantially more devices with our Hwb transformation grant to build further on our provision.





Our School Day

Nursery sessions: 9.00 am - 11.30 am, or 12.30 pm - 3.00 pm.

Nursery Plus: 9.00 am - 11.30 am, or 12.30 pm - 3.00 pm.

Infants: 9.00 am - 3.00 pm.

Juniors: 9.00 am - 3.15 pm.

All pupils have a one-hour break for lunch.



Cares Club (Before & After School)

Morning: 8:15 to 9:00 am Afternoon: 3:00 pm to 5:30

Cares Club aims to provide a happy, safe and stimulating environment for your child before and after school. A wide choice of activities is always available, and all children are given a drink and snack after school. Prices start at £1 for 15 minutes.







Food and Fun

Food and Fun has been running since 2021 and is open to Year 2 to Year 5. This program is free and runs for the first 3 weeks of the summer holidays between the times of 9am and 1pm, where children experience new foods and activities. It is run by the school staff, which enables children to settle in quickly. During their time children are given a free breakfast, healthy snack and a hot meal. The programme welcomes variety of local agencies such as:

Throughout the 3 weeks children take part in nutrition sessions, which are run by the Food and Fun co-ordinator's, children learn about the eat-well plate and experience new foods. Each Thursday parents and siblings are invited for a free lunch, where they sit down and interact with their child while enjoying a nutritious meal. For the first time in 2023 families were given a free bag of food to take home.

Nursery Plus

Nursery Plus, which is staffed by qualified practitioners, provides care for 3 and 4 year old pupils before their Afternoon Nursery session. You can apply for free childcare and early education for up to 30 hours a week. It is available between 9 am and 12.30 pm, at a cost of £13 per session.











School Staff

We currently have five infant and six junior classes. In addition to our 9 full-time teachers, we have 5 part-time teachers and 13 Teaching Assistants, who support learning throughout the school.

Areas of Learning and Experience

At Rhosddu Primary School, all learning experiences are provided through the following Areas of Learning and Experience (AoLEs):

- Literacy and Communication
- Mathematics and Numeracy

The curriculum also covers human rights, diversity and respecting differences, experiences and skills for careers and the workplace, learning about local, national and international contexts and developmentally appropriate relationships and sexuality education.

Sex and Relationships Education (RSE)

At Rhosddu Primary School we follow the mandatory RSE within the curriculum for Wales 2022. The themes have been mapped against the descriptions of learning within the Areas of Learning and Experience. The RSE Code is based on three broad and interlinked learning strands.


- Relationships and identity

- Empowerment, safety and respect





Four Purposes

The four purposes are the shared vision and aspiration for every child at Rhosddu Primary School. They will be the foundation of everything the children learn. Every child will be challenged to become:

- Ambitious, capable learners who are ready to learn throughout their lives.
- Enterprising, creative contributors who are ready to play a part in life and work.
- Ethical, informed citizens who are ready to take part in Wales and the world.
- Healthy, confident individuals who are ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society.







Statements of What Matters

At Rhosddu Primary School we believe that learning should focus on things that matter to the child now and when they grow up. Each Area of Learning Experience contains statements of What Matters which shape the learning for children of all ages. These help the children to think about what they are learning and how topics link to each other, to work and to life. They also support the children to progress each year as they build their understanding and skills. Descriptions of learning quide progression and support learners to achieve the statements of What Matters.

Principles of Progression

At Rhosddu Primary School believe learning and progression go hand in hand, bringing a purposeful approach to sequencing learning. We use Principles of Progression to inform all learning in supporting progression. The principles help teachers to understand how learners should progress and relate broadly to the expectations at 5, 8 and 11 years of age. We use Taith360 to track what the children can do and where they need to go next, this informs our planning and differentiation. Termly meetings are held to discuss the progress of every child and to identify what support needs to be implemented if they are not making the expected progress. Monitoring activities in school and beyond eg with GwE or other school involvement through peer reviews ensure the pace of progression through strong planning, experiences and evaluations is in place.

Developing skills across the curriculum

Literacy, numeracy and digital competence are mandatory cross-curricular skills within the Curriculum for Wales. We believe children should be given opportunities and experiences to develop the cross-curricular skills in a variety of contexts across all Areas of Learning and Experience.







Assessment

Assessment plays a fundamental role in enabling every child at Rhosddu Primary School to make progress at an appropriate pace whilst ensuring they are supported and challenged accordingly. Assessment will be part of every child's learning and they will work with teachers to understand how well they are doing. This is important to help children see where they are in their learning and to plan their next steps. Teachers will use a variety of assessments along with Taith 360 to identify where extra support may be needed and to challenge all children at the correct level. In Early Years pupils are assessed On Entry. All children from Years 2 to 6 will complete the National tests in reading and numeracy. These personalised assessments provide feedback on learners' reading and numeracy skills so that learners, their teachers and their parents and carers can understand where they are in their learning journey.

Inclusivity / Equal opportunities

At Rhosddu Primary School we are committed to creating an inclusive curriculum that allows all pupils to access common opportunities in ways relevant to their needs, and which ensures that they fully belong to the school community. By using a 'Person-Centred' approach we can understand and respond to each of our pupil's unique challenges. This is reflected in our three core values; caring, inspiring and achieving.



A Curriculum Accessible to All

We are working hard to create a fully inclusive curriculum which is accessible to all, and which ensures that all learners are supported to achieve their full potential. Although our learners will all progress along the same continuum of learning within each Area throughout their time with us, the pace at which they do this may differ. Some pupils will need revision or repetition, or different resources and strategies to access their learning. Other pupils will need to be stretched and challenged. Whatever the need, the focus will be on enabling each individual pupil to progress along the continuum of learning at a pace appropriate to them.







Additional Learning Needs

The Welsh Government is changing the way children and young people with SEN are supported. The new system, which puts the learner at the heart of everything that happens, will be brought in gradually over the next few years. Additional Learning needs, often referred to as 'ALN', is used to describe learning difficulties or disabilities that make it harder for a child to learn compared to other children of the same age.

All children may experience challenges with their learning at some point and, for most children, these difficulties can be overcome with support from teachers and home. However, children with ALN are likely to need additional or different help to be able to make progress. More information is available from https://www.gov.wales/additional-learning-needs-aln-system-parents-guide-html We aim to identify any Additional Learning Needs, at an early stage. Children with learning difficulties are given differentiated work and, where appropriate, additional assistance within their classes. Specialist outside help is drawn upon when necessary.

Parents are kept fully informed of their child's progress, and we liaise with the LEA team and High Schools for transition from Year 6. A copy of the school's ALN Policy is available on request.

Homework

Pupils will be expected to do some homework at all stages across the school. Homework will vary year from year. Please see our Homework Policy for more information.

Sport and Extra Curricular Activities

Throughout the school pupils regularly participate in a variety of sporting activities. They also take part in tennis, gym and swimming lessons at specialist venues. There are a variety of clubs for the children to attend such as boardgame club, chess club, STEM club, Criw Cymraeg club, gardening club, drawing club and homework club. Film Club shows one after school film a term, and the pupils enjoy termly discos, organised by our staff. Year 5 spend 'A Night at the Museum' and Year 6 have the opportunity to attend a 3 day residential course where they climb, canoe, sail down zip wires and become expert archers!









The Welsh Language

Although the language of the school is English, Welsh is taught as an additional language to all pupils. Everyday language is encourgaed throughout the school and monitored by members of our Criw Cymraeg. We strive to ensure a Welsh ethos is well-estabished within our school, both in and out of the classroom. Studies of Welsh artists, poets and authors take place in all classes, as well as learning about Welsh culture and heritage in areas across the curriculum.

Pupil Voice

Pupils across the school are encouraged to participate in decision making through School Council, Well-being Council, Eco Committee, Digital Champions, Super Ambassadors and Criw Cymraeg. Year 6 pupils have extra responsibilities as well.



Pastoral Care

Our staff get to know their pupils very well, and our 'open door policy' ensures that we can help them in the most effective way - by working with their families. We know how hard it is for our pupils to achieve all that they are capable of if their emotional well-being is fragile. As well as regular class 'Circle Time' sessions, many pupils continue to benefit from the additional SAP and Friends programmes that we provide.

Religious Education

Religious Education at Rhosddu prepares our pupils for the opportunities, responsibilities and experiences of adult life. Children gain a sound knowledge of not only Christianity, but also of two other major world religions by the time they leave us in Year 6. All religions that we study are accorded equal respect.


Collective Worship

Looked after Children

Pupil and Staff Security

The safety of both our pupils and staff is of paramount importance to us. Various controls and systems are in place such as; coded locks, CCTV and an electronic system for signing in and out. Staff are trained in safeguarding and have received Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015 Prevent training. Our security systems are constantly under review.

Charging and Remissions

Charging

The Governing Body reserves the right to make a charge in the following circumstances, for activities organised by the school:

- School journeys in school hours.
- The board and lodging element of any residential activities deemed to take place within school hours.
- Activities outside of school hours.
- The full cost to each pupil of any activities deemed to be optional extras, taking place outside of school hours.
- The Governing Body may from time to time amend the categories of activities for which a charge may be made.

Nothing in this policy statement precludes the Governing Body from inviting people to make voluntary contributions towards the cost of providing education for the pupils.

Remissions

Parents may qualify for remission for Board and Lodging expenses only. Parents must provide evidence that they are in receipt of the following: Income Support, Jobseeker's Allowance (Income Based) or Child Tax Credit with an income below £16,190.

Disability and Equality

Physical access to the school is not an issue, and the school has toilets adapted for use by disabled pupils, visitors, parents, carers and service users.

Attendance (2022-2023)

We do not encourage holidays during term time and are only able to authorise 10 school days for holidays if a pupil's attendance is more than 90%. The overall whole school attendance for 2022 to 2023 was 91.4%.

HOME-SCHOOL-CHILD AGREEMENT

The School will:-

Support the child in homework and other opportunities for home learning;
